The district was founded in 1945 as the San Antonio Union Junior College District before adopting the Alamo name in 1982.[3]The five colleges in the district operate with a high degree of autonomy, though the colleges' accrediting agency, the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, placed three in a year-long warning period from January 2017 over issues of institutional autonomy.[4] The board of trustees for the district voted to rename the district in January 2017 to reflect issues pertaining to accreditation.[5]St. Philip's College (founded 1898)San Antonio College (founded 1925)Palo Alto College (founded 1983)Northwest Vista College (founded 1995)Northeast Lakeview College (founded 2007)All of the colleges are within San Antonio city limits except Northeast Lakeview, which is within the town limits of Universal City and Live Oak, just to the northeast of the City of San Antonio. Alamo St. and was previously located in multiple offices throughout the city and in a portion of Universal City.The district serves more than 100,000 students in academic and continuing-education programs and employs more than 6,000 faculty and staff.[6][7] It had a budget of \$503 million for the 2023 academic year.
